Town of Hoosick Rescue Squad

The Town of Hoosick Volunteer Rescue Squad is one of the few volunteer rescue squads left in Rensselaer County. With a history that dates back to 1957, the rescue squad has seen its numbers decrease steadily. The most members it had was 52, the fewest was 17 and as of 2012 it has 22. With more people traveling to work, people feel they cannot be on the squad. That is not correct. The rescue squad is accommodating to every person who volunteers. If the rescue squad ceases to exist it could take over one hour or more to get an ambulance to an accident scene. Meetings are held the second Wednesday of the month at 7:00PM.

A Brief History

Hoosick Falls is a village in Rensselaer County, New York, United States. The village of Hoosick Falls is near the center of the town of Hoosick on NY 22. The village center is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as Hoosick Falls Historic District. Painter Grandma Moses is buried in the village. The site of the British entrenchments at the Battle of Bennington, 6 August 1777, is nearby and is maintained as Bennington Battlefield State Historic Site. Although this has been an issue of considerable debate, it's believed the first documented settlers came to Hoosick Falls on the Hoosic River, around 1746. *Encyclopedia Americana* reports the date of the first permanent settlement as 1688. The French drove the settlers out in 1754 and most of the settlement was burned, but they returned and rebuilt after the French & Indian War ended. Hoosick Falls was incorporated as a village in 1827.

In 1852 a blacksmith named Walter A. Wood began manufacturing a reaper in Hoosick Falls. By the 1890s the Walter A. Wood Mowing & Reaping Company was the largest farm machinery manufacturer in the world, taking up 85 acres (340,000 m²) on the west bank of the river. The Wood Company closed in 1924, mainly due to the introduction of John Deere's revolutionary self-propelled farm equipment. Most of these facilities were used by the Colasta Corporation from the mid-1920s until the late 1950s. This company manufactured radio parts. Along with the Walter Wood plant, Hoosick Falls was a boomtown in the 19th century. Many other businesses came into town, bringing people and money with them. Hoosick Falls once had factories that made Paper, small numbers of Appliances, Parts, Glass, and some nominal Soda and Beer Bottling Plants. A large number of rich Victorian homes were built during this period and are still there today. Hoosick Falls is trying for a revival with the opening of Brown's Brewing , manufacturing craft beer in Walloomsac, and a revival of the Arts in the Village proper. Hoosick Falls is rich in history of famous artists; Bob and Ray Eberle, Harriot Hocter, Jose de Creeft Grandma Moses and Jenny Holzer to name a few.
